

1. Academic preparation

**Problem:** Students are not academically prepared to succeed in

college

#### **Policy/programming response:**

- Remedial classes
- Instructional reform
- Academic supports





#### 2. Tuition costs

**Problem:** Students are unable to afford the cost of school

#### **Policy/programming response:**

- Pell grants (\$30 billion)
- Other tuition assistance






- 3. External shocks
  - **Problem:** Life gets in the way
  - 36% are food insecure
  - 36% are housing insecure

#### Policy/programming response:

- Emergency aid
- Holistic services

#### 4. Personal obstacles


#### **Problem:**

- Navigating the system (lack key information)
- Self-efficacy (trouble staying on task, setting goals)
- Bandwidth (Mullinathian and Shafir, 2013)

#### **Policy/programming response:**

Holistic services

# **Opening Doors**

- Key components
  - 1. Instructional reform (Linked classes, etc.)
  - 2. Financial incentives
  - 3. Students services

Results: mixed

#### Other efforts to increase persistence



# Accelerated Study in Associate Programs (ASAP)

- Key components
  - 1. Enhanced advising/tutoring
  - 2. Scheduling (i.e. blocked courses)
  - 3. Financial support (i.e. tuition waivers)
- Results: Doubled graduation rates!





# Description of *Stay the* Course<sup>TM</sup>



## **Principles:**

- Strengths-based
- Customizable
- Holistic
- Long-term

#### **Activities**

- Goal setting and planning
- Resource connection
- Field trips, engagement events, graduation ceremonies















# Description of *Stay the Course*<sup>TM</sup>



#### Cadence

- Weekly contact
- 2 meetings/month
- Student's complete action step every 3 weeks

## **Emergency Financial Assistance**

- \$1,500 / student; \$500 / semester
- Non-academic, emergency needs



### The Evaluation





#### Two treatment arms:

- Stay the Course
- EFA only

#### Key Outcomes:


- Still actively enrolled
- Earned a degree










#### Impact of STC After 6 Semesters









#### Impact of EFA After 6 Semesters








## Impact of STC After 8 Semesters

#### Is the Investment Worth It?



#### **Costs**

- Cost per student/year = \$1,880
- Three-year cost = \$5,640

#### Return

• Effects for persistence and completion imply an increase in earnings of \$1,326 per year

#### **Breakeven**


 Added earnings exceed cost of program after 4.25 years in workforce after schooling




# Key to broad impact: Scale and replicate!


# Key Takeaways




- Long term evidence suggests the positive impact of STC persists
- STC evidence is fueling a broad debate about financial assistance only vs. financial assistance with case management
- Too early to draw strong conclusions from results for newest cohort, but there are reasons to be optimistic

### Impact of EFA After 8 Semesters








#### Impact of STC After 2 Semesters




#### Still Enrolled in School -Fall 2015, Spring 2016, and Fall 2016 Cohorts Combined




#### **Annual Tuition for College in 2014/15**
