Why approach 60x30TX regionally?

- Regions and institutions differ in many ways
- However, institutional actions and outcomes are embedded in regional context
 - High school feeder patterns
 - Transfer networks
 - Local labor market
- Institutional target-setting improved by considering context
- Encourages tactical planning


