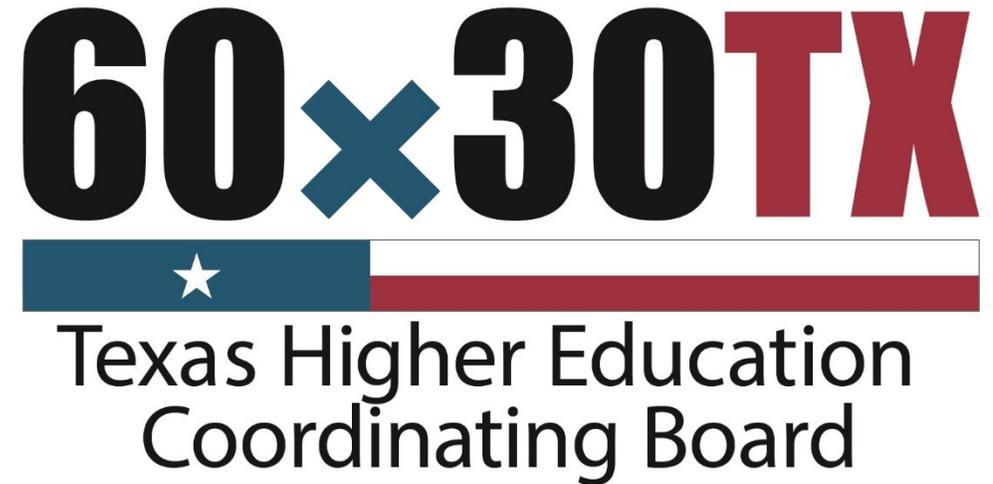

Emergency Aid Programs

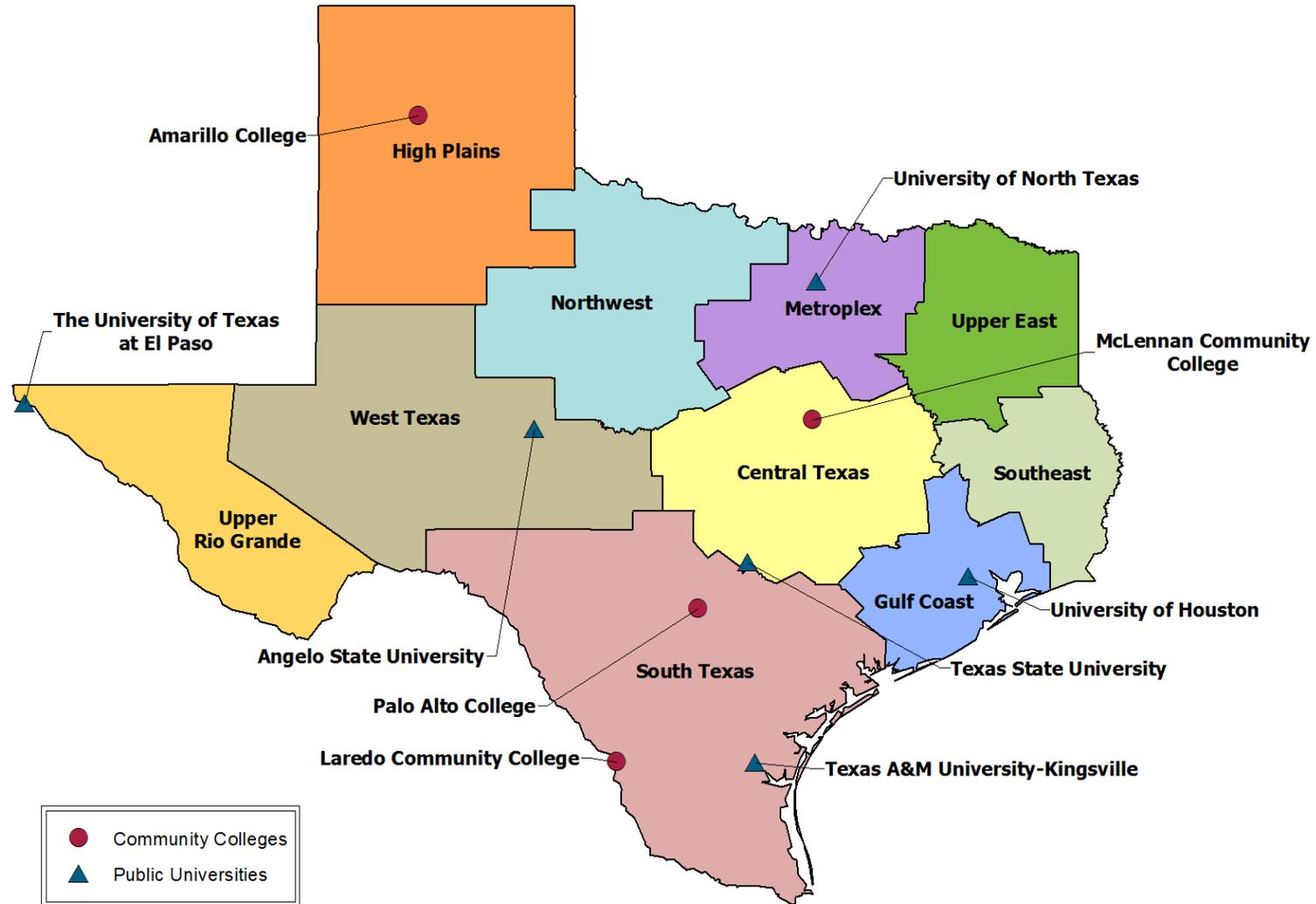
- **Direct small amounts of money**, sometimes as little as \$300, to students who are struggling to pay for a financial emergency
- Designed to support students in meeting **unexpected financial needs** and help them **stay on the path to graduation**

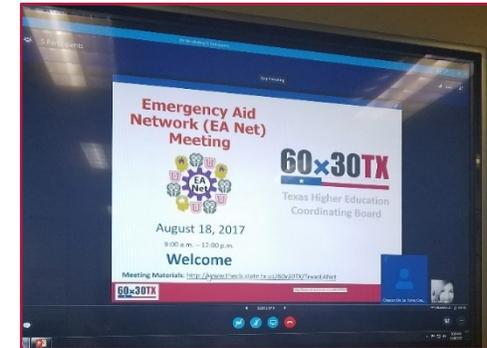
4 Phases

What We've Learned . . .

For effective emergency aid programs, colleges and universities should ...

1. Clearly define emergency for their programs
2. Simplify administration, and train staff and faculty on processes
3. Reach students where they are in modes of communication
4. Form community partnerships for sustainable funding
5. Use automated technology
6. Create a "Culture of Caring"
