Report on the Recruitment of Persons with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities at Public Institutions of Higher Education in Texas

The Texas Education Code (TEC), Section 61.0664, authorized through the passage of Senate Bill (SB) 37, 84th Legislature, Regular Session, requires the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board (THECB) to conduct an ongoing study on the college recruitment of persons with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD). According to the statute, the study is to “identify previously made recruitment efforts, limitations on recruitment and possible methods for recruitment” for this population (TEC, Section 61.0664(c)). Reports are to be submitted to the governor and members of the Legislature by November 1 of each even-numbered year.

The THECB staff, with the assistance of stakeholders from public institutions of higher education (IHEs) and the community, developed a survey instrument for collecting recruitment-related data. On August 11, 2016, the THECB distributed a memorandum to university and college presidents and community college liaisons with instructions for accessing the survey and a request that responses be submitted by August 31, 2016.¹

Of the 102 IHEs sent the survey, 68 responded to the recruitment report. Of that number, 17 reported they engaged in some sort of recruitment activity targeting students with IDD. Among those 17 institutions, eight specifically recruited to a special program for students with IDD, while 12 recruited students with IDD into their general academic population, and some recruited to both. Common recruitment activities included:

- Presenting information at secondary schools (94.1 percent)
- Participating in career or transition fairs (94.1 percent)
- Distributing materials about programs and services for students with IDD (82.4 percent)
- Including information for potential students with IDD in general college materials (82.4 percent)
- Collaborating with the Department of Assistive and Rehabilitative Services and Access College Texas to connect with populations that may benefit from those programs

The commonly cited limitations to recruiting students with IDD to institutions of higher education included:

- Having insufficient time and staff to appropriately address the need for these recruitment efforts
- Inability of students with IDD to attend recruitment activities due to unavailability of transportation
- Underpreparation of incoming students with IDD as they transition into higher education

- Lack of financial aid for students enrolling in certain types of transitional programs for students with IDD

A copy of the recruitment questions is provided as Appendix B.

To meet the SB 37 assignment to conduct an ongoing study on recruitment of persons with IDD, the THECB will continue to update and distribute the survey in the summer of even-numbered years and provide updated information to the governor and members of the Legislature.

In addition to the study on recruitment, SB 37 also required that the THECB collect administrative data on students with IDD enrolled in public IHEs. Through collaboration with stakeholders, a rule was drafted and approved by the THECB's board (Texas Administrative Code, Section 4.12) that requires all IHEs to indicate whether an enrolled student is identified as having an IDD, which allows the agency to track their academic success. Beginning in 2018, the report will include summary information obtained through those new data collection efforts, in addition to information on recruitment efforts.

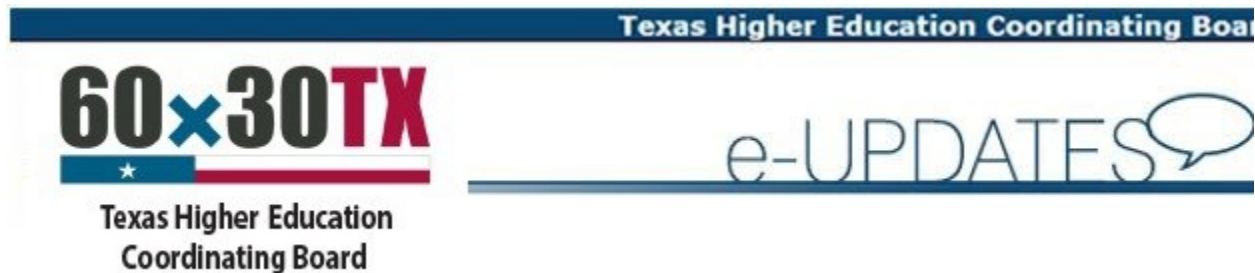

SB 37 & HB 1807 Survey of Recruitment & Inventory of Postsecondary Programs and Services for Persons with Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities (IDD)

Senate Bill 37, 84th Legislature, requires that the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board (Coordinating Board) collect and study data on the participation of persons with intellectual and developmental disabilities (IDD) at public institutions of higher education. It further requires the Coordinating Board to conduct an ongoing study of the college recruitment of persons with IDD. The study is to "identify previously made recruitment efforts, limitations on recruitment and possible methods for recruitment."

House Bill 1807, 84th Legislature, requires the Coordinating Board to maintain an inventory of postsecondary educational programs and services provided for persons with IDD by institutions of higher education.

In fulfilling this legislative mandate, we ask that you or your designee complete a survey about recruitment of persons with IDD and the postsecondary programs and services

available at your institution for persons with IDD. Completion of the survey should take about 15-20 minutes.

In order to get started in the IDD portal, you must obtain a CBID for that purpose, even if you currently have a CBID for another Coordinating Board portal. All new and current CBID holders will need to request access to the IDD portal with a new CBID. A link to the IDD User's Manual is available at: [IDD User's Guide](#) for your assistance. Instructions for obtaining a CBID begins on page 6. The manual will additionally be helpful in addressing other issues you may run into.

To assist you in determining who on your campus should complete the survey, a copy is attached. However, please note that the survey must be completed online. **We ask that you complete the survey by no later than 3:00 pm, Monday, August 29, 2016.**
