## Status of the 85th Legislature

- The 85<sup>th</sup> Texas Legislature ended its Regular Session on May 29.
- Governor Abbott called a Special Session of the Legislature that began on July 18 and may last up to 30 days.
- The Governor included 20 items for consideration by the Legislature, but may expand that list at any time.

Major Board Recommendations ADOPTED by the Legislature:

### **Oversight of Career Colleges**

SB 1781 by Sen. West (House Sponsor: Rep. M. Gonzalez)

This legislation strengthens the Coordinating Board's oversight of forprofit degree-granting institutions of higher education. The legislation helps ensure solvency and stability of these institutions so that they will continue to serve their students. The bill also allows the Coordinating Board to maintain a repository for academic records.

The General Appropriations Act for FY18-19 includes \$500,000 in the Coordinating Board's budget for implementation of this legislation.



## **Board Recommendations**

Major Board Recommendations ADOPTED by the Legislature:

#### Student Debt Letters

SB 887 by Sen. Seliger (House Sponsor: Rep. Clardy)

This act requires institutions of higher education to provide students, at least annually, estimates regarding their education loan debt in an electronic form. The disclosure to the student must include an estimate of the total amount of state and federal education loans incurred by the student, an estimate of the total payoff amount, or a range for that amount, including principal and interest, and an estimate of the monthly repayment amount that the student may incur.

Major Board Recommendations ADOPTED by the Legislature:

### **Returning Adult Students**

SB 1782 by Sen. West (House Sponsor: Rep. Clardy)

This bill allows returning adult students a one-time exemption from current restrictions on state formula funding, including the "six-drop rule," "30-hour" and "45-hour rules," and the "three-peat" rule. SB 1782 is meant to encourage adult students who have dropped a number of courses or exceeded the number of courses required for their degree plans to return to school and finish their degrees.

## **Board Recommendations**

Major Board Recommendations ADOPTED by the Legislature:

#### **Community College Baccalaureate Degrees**

SB 2118 by Sen. Seliger (House Sponsor: Rep. Davis)

This bill allows the Coordinating Board to authorize baccalaureate degree programs in nursing, applied technology and applied science at community colleges under certain restrictions. Eligible community colleges must have a minimum taxable valuation of \$6 billion and are limited to offering three baccalaureate degree programs at any time. The Coordinating Board is required to use the same standards and criteria for approving baccalaureate degree programs at universities, as well as some standards specific to these degrees.

**Major Board Recommendations ADOPTED by the Legislature:** 

### **Prioritizing Graduate Medical Education**

HCR 102 by Rep. Lozano (Senate Sponsor: Sen. Schwertner)

This concurrent resolution states that the Legislature expresses its support for prioritizing a substantial increase in funding for graduate medical education before it considers authorizing the creation and support of additional medical schools in the state. It also charges the Coordinating Board to work with institutions of higher education and the medical community to achieve the 1.1 to 1 goal for graduate medical education.

## **Board Recommendations**

Major Board Recommendations NOT ADOPTED by the Legislature:

### **Coordinating the Expansion of Higher Education**

SB 828 by Sen Seliger/HB 1737 by Rep Alvarado

This legislation would have created a process whereby the Coordinating Board would review and approve only institutions' proposed new academic and research locations outside of their existing campuses to prevent unnecessary duplication.

SB 828 passed the Senate, but was not finally adopted in the House.

Major Board Recommendations NOT ADOPTED by the Legislature:

### **Financial Aid Recommendations**

The Coordinating Board made recommendations to increase the effectiveness of the TEXAS Grant and TEOG programs, and to restructure off-campus work-study (Texas WORKS).

No financial aid legislation advanced due to concern over its susceptibility to amendments that would limit the program to students eligible for federal financial aid. This would bar undocumented students from participating in these programs.

## **Board Recommendations**

Major Board Recommendations NOT ADOPTED by the Legislature:

### **Outcomes Based Funding for Universities**

The Coordinating Board recommended that General Academic Institutions be funded, in part, through a Graduation Bonus that would award \$500 for each undergraduate degree awarded, increased to \$1,000 if the degree is awarded to a student at-risk of non-completion.

While multiple bills were filed to implement outcomes-based funding, none advanced.
