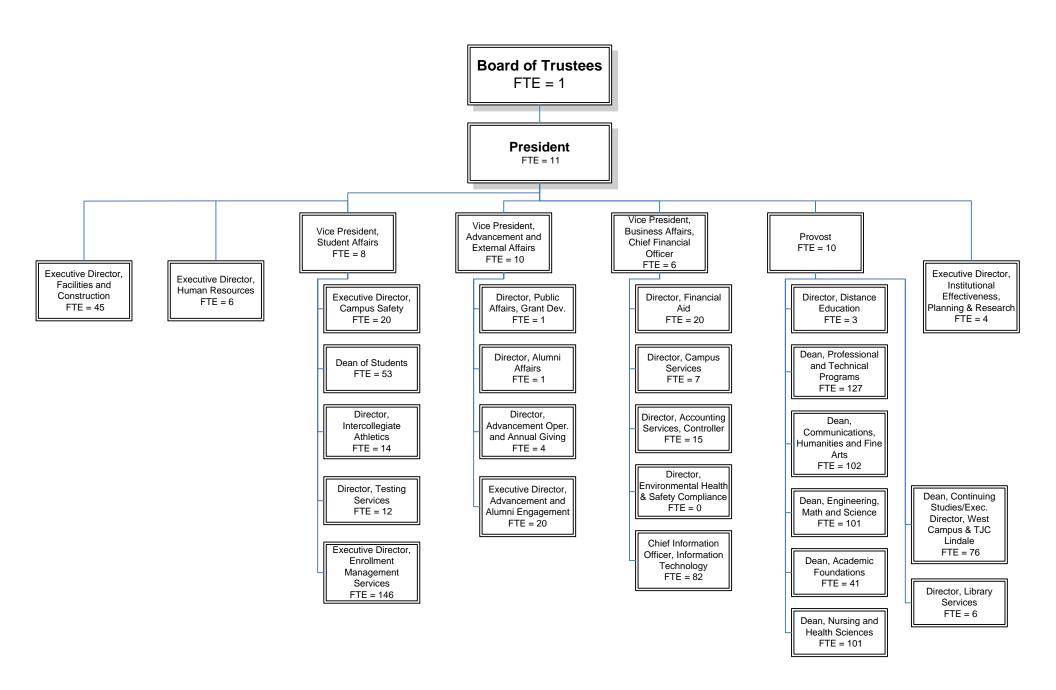

educational opportunities at our institutions, the College District endorses the \$2.011 billion request for student success funding for the 2016-17 biennium and recommends, as the July 16, 2014 letter outlines, that funding for community colleges be appropriated through three strategies in the General Appropriations Act:

Core College Operations: \$50 million for the 2016-17 biennium; Student Success Points: 10% of remaining funds; student success points should be funded at a rate student success points were funded for the 2014-15 biennium (\$185 per student success point); and Contact Hour Funding: 90% of remaining funds.
