Since 1926, Tyler Junior College has been fulfilling three promises to its students and the local communities by providing a quality education, a vibrant student life and the opportunities for service to the communities.

The College provides a vast amount of degree and certificate options and commits to ensuring students will have access to faculty who are academically prepared, current in their subject matter and care about the success of their students. In addition, the College is committed to providing the support services designed to help students achieve their academic and career goals. Equally important is the emphasis on a vibrant student life that improves their potential for success.

Through their studies and involvement in organizations, students come in contact with numerous opportunities for service learning, volunteerism and community assistance, making East Texas a better place to live and instilling in TJC students a sense of responsibility.

Tyler Junior College was created in 1926 as part of the Tyler public school system to serve the higher education needs of area citizens. 60x30TX, Tyler Junior College supports the \$1.8 billion formula funding request that was outlined in the July 28, 2016 letter from the Texas Association of Community Colleges sent on behalf of the 50 public community colleges of Texas.

The additional funding support from the State of Texas will positively impact Tyler Junior College in the following manner:

Estimated Funding 2018-2019:

Core College Operations: \$1,500,000; Student Success Points: \$3,454,216; and Instructional Contact Hour Funding: \$29,913,662. Estimated Total Funding for 2018-2019: \$34,866,878. This Estimated Total Funding for 2018-2019 compares to the Total Funding for 2016-2017 of \$33,255,306.

Additional Funding Support for TJC to invest in the 2018-19 Biennium:

2018-19 Biennium: \$1,611,572 Each Year of Biennium: \$805,786

The following investments will be supported with the additional state funding:

To promote a successful college going and completion culture for the East Texas region. TJC is the lead community college for the region's collective impact work through the Tyler Area Partnership 4 Education, which now includes over 50 organizations working together to successfully meet the 60x30TX goals.

The College is working diligently to meet and exceed the vision of the Texas Legislature and is collaborating with the health care communities to successfully launch the first Bachelor of Science degree. This has required a strong collaboration with the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board, the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools, and the professional community from the region.

The College is also strategically expanding the dual credit offerings, in both the academic and workforce areas, promoting a pathway for students to higher education. Additionally, the College in collaboration with two of its school districts, has launched two Early College High Schools.


Through several committees and task forces, TJC is strengthening the research aspects related to its key performance indicators, and developing strategies to positively influence the respective outcomes.

TJC continues to build capacity by enhancing its professional development arm, creating targeted academies and pathways for strengthening the human resource aspect of the institution.
